


Minutes

- I. Roll Call: Jackie Govan called the meeting to order at 11:02 am. The following members participated in the zoom meeting: Myra Wood, Lonnie Waller, Denise Middlebrook, Barbie Baxter, Alethia Henderson, Cyndi Musick, Tamara Griffin, Christie Campbell, Shirley Pulliam, Lonnie Waller, Jackie Burton, Latasha Dodd, and Amy Salazar as well as Guests: Jackie Govan, Tonya Williams, Deana Howell, Ginger Galban, and Kathy Miliken.
- II. Consideration of Agenda
- III. Approval of Minutes: *Jackie Burton made a motion to approve the minutes as submitted. Amy Salazar seconded the motion. All were in favor. The motion carried.*
- IV. Jackie Govan introduced the Guest Speakers:
 - A. Tonya Williams, Assistant Commissioner, Arkansas Department of Education, DESE, Office of Early Childhood: The Office of Early Childhood (formerly DCCECE) has moved under the Arkansas Department of Education/DESE but is still located at the Department of Human Services. The phones are not working because of the change in systems and they are not receiving voice mail. Please email Office of Early Childhood Staff. The nutrition team is moving to the ADE Nutrition Team under Dr. Eric Saunders. Pam Burton is the team lead. Arkansas Better Chance is back under Office of Early Childhood. Part B/C will be under Matt Sewell at the Office of Special Education. Danita Pitts will be the lead for Part B/C. She will keep schools will only have posted on the physical move. As of October 1, any employees in public school will only have to have one background check. They are working to transition maltreatment checks to a five-year cycle. The Office of Early Childhood has announced Cohort One for the Local Leads that will work to unify early childhood program at the local level. The first cohort includes 12 leads. There will be a spring cohort and should be statewide by 2026 school year. The purpose is to build relationships and assess the needs of the local community as well as gaps in services. They will write a comprehensive plan for addressing these gaps and expanding quality. Funding was given to coops, school districts, child care aware, City of Little Rock with Excel by Eight. They are repromulgating all rules and regulation including ABC, child care licensing, and Better Beginnings. They are adding the kindergarten readiness definition to all regulations. She encouraged programs to contact Daw Jeffrey or her about barriers in licensing. She announced that Arkansas was # 1 in the nation for early childhood systems. She thanked Jackie Govan and Head Start programs for helping to achieve this ranking. The Office of Early Childhood will be piloting CLASS in place of ECERS. Scoring will not count against programs in the first year. Tonya asked for any comments or concerns about CLASS or ECERS.

B. Kathy Milliken, Sales Account Specialist, Bissell Home Care: Kathy shared information about Sanitaire products that would be beneficial to programs.



C. Ginger Galban, Regional Partnership Director, LENA: Ginger shared an overview of LENA Grow which focuses on making every interaction count in the classroom. LENA Start is parent focused and increases school readiness through interactive talk. LENA Grow is embedded in professional development and reflective based coaching. It is evidenced based and supports the early child work force. Some features: improve child outcomes, engage families, crosswalks with CLASS and Pyramid Model. It has had a huge impact on Infant Toddler CLASS scores as well as PreK. The LENA in a box Grow Materials include a Coach and Teacher Guide, Conversation Starter posters, talking tiers, vests, and the LENA device. Coaching Sessions are 30 minutes weekly, one on one or group sessions, reflective coaching. For more information contact gingergalban@lena.org or 682-244-9422.

- B. New Partnerships are in the making with the Head Start State Collaboration Office, Arkansas Community Action Agencies Association, and the Community Services Block Grant. Tomekia Moore, Beverly Buchana, and Jackie Govan have put in place a state interagency agreement for all three agencies. Jackie Govan has also provided an action plan to carry out the duties and activities of this action plan. The implementation will begin in January 2024.
- C. Disability Services: Jackie Govan share that Cassandra Roy has agreed to serve as the Facilitator for the Head Start Disability Coordinators and Early Childhood Specialists Committee.
- D. Homelessness in EHS/HS: The committee is focusing on ending homelessness for families.
- E. Nominating Committee: Jackie Govan shared that the members need to select a nominating committee to get a slate of officers and representatives. Shirley Pulliam, Lonnie Waller, and Christie Campbell volunteered.

VII. Reports

- A. Arkansas Early Childhood Commission (SAC)-Barbie Baxter reported that the commission met on October 17. The commission meeting focused on the LEARN Act Updates. There was a long discussion about the CLASS pilot. They shared information about the LEAD process. Barbie reported on some of the issues affecting Head Start which became a big discussion item. The commission will work on getting help to programs about retention and recruitment of staff. On October 30th, Barbie received her official commission.
- B. Arkansas Head Start-State Collaboration Office-Jackie Govan shared information about the Pyramid Model Project Grant to provide data on evidenced based research. The three tiers look at promotion, intervention, and implementation.

Khari Garvin has given four new priorities to the Collaboration Office. The Office of Head Start (OHS) established four priority areas to guide the work of the Head Start Collaboration Offices (HSCOs).

1. Collaborate with state systems to align early care and education services and supports for children and families prenatally to age 5.

Collaborate across systems to support:

- Health, mental health, and social and emotional well-being
- Home visiting
- Comprehensive service delivery
- Services and supports for children who are experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, children with disabilities, and children who are dual language learners
- Quality improvements
- School readiness initiatives
- State background check systems
- Child care
- Child welfare
- Early Head Start-Child Care Partnerships
- Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Health Integration Prenatal-to-3 Programs
- 2. Work with state efforts to collect and use data on early childhood programs to guide decision-making and improve child and family outcomes.

Support appropriate access to and use of data to guide decision-making and to improve outcomes in areas such as coordinated eligibility and disparities in access to services.

3. Support the expansion of and access to high-quality workforce and career development opportunities for staff.

Work with state professional development systems, including workforce registries and career pathways, and with institutions of higher education to promote expansion and high-quality career development opportunities.

4. Coordinate with school systems to ensure continuity and alignment across programs, as appropriate.

Promote continuity of services, program alignment, and support for successful transitions, particularly with state preschool, kindergarten, and with Title I, McKinney-Vento, and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act programs.

Jackie is in process of completing the continuation application which is due December 1st. This will go before the Arkansas Head Start Association's Board of Directors for approval today.

- C. Region VI Head Start Association-Jackie Govan reported that Region VI met virtually. Paula is working to reinstate the nonprofit status. Someone is working on the policies for the Region VI Head Start Association. The next meeting will be in January with the Dallas Regional Office.
- D. Arkansas Head Start Association Institute-Jackie Burton shared that the institute would be at the DoubleTree hotel and Robinson Center on April 30-May 3, 2024. The institute committee approved the budget. The call for papers have been sent out and posted. There will be a masquerade reception. There will be a Come As you Wish costume and dance party with DJ Jellybean. There will be a partnership networking event. Jackie Govan is working with the hotel on sleeping rooms.
- E. National Head Start Association Updates-Jackie Govan shared information about bills that are proposed. One bill would establish an apprenticeship program between employers and institutions of higher education. Another bill proposed by Danny Davis and Mike Gallagher is the RISE from trauma program for trauma informed care focusing on mitigating, preventing, and healing from trauma. The next meeting is January 21st in Washington DC.
