

Monte Payne-Peer Recovery Support Specialist

Monte Payne PRPS suffered through years of addiction to CRACK on the streets of Los Angeles. When he finally decided to make a try for a new life, Monte came to Arkansas in the trunk of a car to escape murderous drug dealers looking for revenge! He tried, but his new life was not to be-within a few years, Monte was back in the iron grip of crack cocaine. He was once more on the streets, in Arkansas this time. In 2004, Monte entered Hoover Treatment Center and began a new life in earnest this time. He did so well that, in 2007, the Courts awarded him custody of his then 12-year-old son. Monte raised his son and put him through college at UCA. Pretty impressive for a man who spent years on the streets struggling with his addiction.

Equally impressive is the fact that in 2007 Monte also began working at the Hoover Treatment Center as a case manager. He worked in treatment housing and after care and, over time, has helped thousands of individuals get sober. Monte's life continues its upward spiral. In 2018, Monte began working as a Peer Support Specialist and trainer and, here, found his niche. Monte has trained more Peers in Arkansas than any other trainer by far. In 2019, he was named Trainer of the Year at the first Arkansas Peer Support Conference. Monte is well-credentialed and extensively active in his community: Monte is a certified Narcan trainer. He is a member of Community Health Worker's Certification Committee. He is a UAMS grant reviewer. He is a member of TRI (Translation Research Institute). He is on the board of the Arkansas Peer Advisory Committee. He is a member of the Arkansas Peers Achieving Recovery Together Coalition. He is on the board of Better Community Development. He is a Peer Recovery Peer Supervisor and is currently working at Wolfe Street Foundation as the Peer Program Manager.

Cpl. Jjesus Anaya- Overdose Investigator

Cpl. Jjesus Anaya has been employed with the Hot Springs Police Department for 11 years. In those 11 years, he has served in Patrol (3.5 years), Narcotics (5.5 years) and has been the Overdose Investigator for the last 2 years. He is also the current team leader for the Hot Springs Police Departments SWAT team. Through the 11 years he has been employed, he has seen several individuals battle substance abuse and enjoys working with individuals to overcome their addictions.


Tenesha Barnes, Deputy Director of the Arkansas Opioid Recovery Partnership






Dollar per Child Report- Deana gave the Dollar Per Child report. \$329.00 was paid directly to the NHSA. A check in the amount of \$5,753.44 was sent to the NHSA. Arkansas has an amount due of \$168.00 owed to the NHSA.

Arkansas Head Start Association Membership Dues Report- A balance of \$880.00 in membership dues is owed from the 2019-20 year and \$4,782.50 owed for 2020-21. Invoices will be sent to agencies stating the agency's balance owed in dues. Dues are calculated at \$5.00 per allotted program slot.

Arkansas Head Start Association Treasurer's Report- Deana gave the Treasurer's Report. The total expenses as of July 31, 2021, are \$12,993.13 with \$36,533.52 on hand. There is an AHSA balance of \$56,305.83, a PayPal balance of \$419.94, and a deposit of certificates for \$31,418.44.

Class Reports- All Classes met on September 1, 2021, during the conference. Sara Wilhite gave the Directors Class report commenting on how successful the conference was going and she spoke about Arkansas hosting Regional Conference next year. Jackie Burton gave the Staff Class report. She spoke on agency's Covid-19 procedures, the conference, and the need for more staff participation. There was no Parents Class report because no parents attended the meeting. Jackie Govan encouraged staff to find parent representatives for the Parent Class. Blake Stansbery was the only attendee for the Friends Class meeting. There was no report.

Arkansas Early Childhood Commission/State Advisory Council- There was no report.

Head Start State Collaboration Office- Jackie Govan gave the Arkansas Head Start-State Collaboration Office report. Jackie report that they are preparing for the 2022 School Readiness Summit. The summit will focus on Social-emotional wellness. There have been 4 sessions held on Six Degrees to Racial Equity, with 2 sessions remaining. Jackie reported on the fatherhood mentoring program for dads in high school. The program will provide gifts for the child and a graduation celebration. The program curriculum is being review and will possibly be updated.

Arkansas Head Start Association Institute- Sara Wilhite gave the report stating there were less participants than planned. She thanked Jackie Govan and Deana for their work, time, and dedication to producing a successful conference. She encouraged participant to visit the silent auction and to complete their evaluation surveys.

Region VI Head Start Association- Jackie Govan announced that the 2022 Region VI Head Start Conference will be hosted by Arkansas on September 27-30, 2022.

National Head Start Association- Jackie Govan gave the National Head Start Association report. She discussed that agencies should apply for the child tax credit and that agencies should research and follow the news on Universal Pre-K.

New Officers- A invite was made to all attendees to join or be more actively involved with the Arkansas Head Start Association. There is really a need for Parents and Friends representatives.

Adjournment- Susan Templeton made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Barbie Baxter seconded the motion. All were in favor. The motion carried.

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
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


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


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
